

The BOEING Company - More than Airplanes

William Edward Boeing (October 1, 1881-September 28, 1956) grew up in Detroit, Michigan and later attended Yale's Scientific School. After graduating in 1904, he entered the lumber business and spent five years learning the logging industry in Grays Harbor, Washington. He arrived in Seattle in 1908 where he continued to manage his timber lands, establishing the Greenwood Timber Company. He became interested in the fledgling aviation industry as a hobby, took flying lessons under the tutelage of Glenn Martin in 1911, and purchased a Martin hydroplane. Boeing became convinced of the airplane's future as a means of transportation and became a pioneer in the design and manufacture of airplanes just before America's entry into World War I.

The pre-cursor to The Boeing Company started by Boeing was Heath's Shipyard in Seattle, Washington, which he bought March 10, 1910. This location became his first airplane factory with a first flight over Seattle. He built the Hanger in the Lake Union area in December 1915. Boeing began assembly of the first B&W Seaplane in the Lake Union boathouse in January 1916. On June 15, Bluebill B&W took its maiden flight; it was sold with another B&W to New Zealand in 1918. On July 15, Boeing incorporated Pacific Aero Products Company. He bought 998 of the 1,000 stocks issued and moved the operation to the shipyard that he bought in 1910. Many years later, this Red Barn building moved to Seattle's Museum of Flight. On May 9, 1917, Boeing changed the name of Pacific Aero Products to the Boeing Airplane Company. On July 17, 1917, the company's first two of the 50 Model C's flew to Florida for the Navy. This war contract with the U.S. Navy for 50 trainer airplanes, and a postwar order from the Army Air Services for 200 pursuit plans assured the future of his company.

The Boeing Airplane Company is the largest and most successful commercial aircraft manufacturer in the world. Expanding first into the production of military aircraft during WWI (1914-1918) and then into contracts for scheduled mail delivery and regular commercial

passenger service, the Boeing empire eventually included all aspects of aviation, from technological development and aircraft production to international airline transportation systems.

In 1919, with Boeing at the controls**, the first air mail between Vancouver BC and Seattle was flown—an event which led to the company becoming involved with the U.S. airmail contracts in later years.

**Historical note: According to the Seattle newspapers of that day, Eddie Hubbard actually flew the first air mail route on March 3, 1919 carrying Boeing as a passenger.

By 1928, the Boeing Company had become one of the largest U.S. aircraft manufacturers, and was deeply involved with air transportation as well. The prestigious Guggenheim Medal was awarded to him in 1934 for his

pioneering and achievement in aircraft and air transportation. Under his direction, Boeing Air Transport became the first to fly passengers at night on regular schedules and long distances.

In 1934, forced by the Federal government to dissolve the interlocking partnerships between the manufacturing and transportation divisions, Boeing resigned from the industry he had pioneered and turned to other interests. He returned during World War II (1939-1945) to assist in fulfilling the vast military production requirements. Although he was active in the aviation scene for only 18 years, few men in history have contributed so much to a single industry.

After expanding to Kansas, Louisiana and 6 other US states, The Boeing Company eventually built the world's largest factory in Everett, Washington in 1966 to begin construction on the 747. Boeing started design and construction of water crafts in 1960's, starting with Hydrofoils.

At the same time Boeing was building up his airplane manufacturing company, he was also having a home built for him in The Highlands, a newly established exclusive gated residential community located on a wooded bluff overlooking Puget Sound immediately north of Seattle.

Executive Secretary's Notes



Let me put out the call: Please, clubs or individual members, give us feedback.

Every now and then someone asks why their club should pay dues to the Federation? What does the Federation do for them? In return I ask what do

the clubs want the Federation to do for them?

When I respond to those who ask what the Federation does for them, I first use as an example, the *Federated Philatelist*, our journal of news and articles. The journal is emailed to individuals in all clubs and the expectation is that someone in each local club will forward it to the rest of their membership.

In addition to our journal, the Federation encourages and supports the John Arn Symposium each spring in Moses Lake, Washington. There are speakers, two auctions and food. A fun time for all!

The Federation encourages and supports PIPEX, the -now only- WSP show in the Northwest, but most club members don't attend PIPEX because, I suspect, of the huge distance involved to get there. Seven 2023 member clubs are over 500 miles from Portland, OR, the site of PIPEX. Most are over 150, enough to make a round trip more than a day's effort.

The Federation holds a materials archive of club memorabilia in Spokane, WA. See Bill Ailes' report elsewhere in this issue about items recently received. Other clubs are encouraged to offer materials.

The Federation honors and respects collectors by publishing show palmares, by offering three awards for Northwest collectors and by listing closed albums of individual collectors.

The Federation has in its By-laws committees for Judging, Youth and Education. In the past these have been active in finding judges for local shows, in encouraging youth and new collectors, and in presenting programs on what philately is or on how to exhibit. These committees are inactive now not because we lack people with the expertise to do them but because the services have not been requested in over a decade.

In a new push of services, the Federation is offering to help communication among clubs. Now we want to facilitate contacts that will lead to speakers from one club presenting at another via Zoom. The first of these Zoom programs hasn't happened yet; we wait for requests.

I do believe there are good reasons for the Federation to exist, but clubs cannot be just passive receivers of the journal. Besides the *Federated Philatelist*, which can be supported with news, articles and letters, all of the reasons to have the Federation are that it gives indirect help to the clubs and their members. These reasons require action from the local clubs to happen.

Philately has changed, and I believe the Federation can change as our member clubs direct us. I issue this call: We accomplish more together. Help us to decide what. Roll up your sleeves with us.

P.S. Membership in the Federation is cheap, somewhere between 50¢ and \$1 for each individual club member per year. Please get your dues in because we need to know your club exists.



Thunderbird Award

The Northwest Federation provides a ribbon to be awarded to a worthy exhibit at all shows held within the geographic area of the Federation. The purpose of this award is to encourage exhibiting, whether or not the exhibitor is a member of a Federation organization.

Exhibits that receive a Vermeil or higher award are not eligible, and the judges of the show have sole authority to award or not award the ribbon.

Member clubs that hold shows with competitive exhibits can request the Thunderbird ribbon from the Executive Secretary. Local and regional shows are authorized to present a single award and national shows may present two awards.

Board of Directors Meeting Minutes

Northwest Federation of Stamp Clubs PIPEX, Clackamas Room May 4, 2024

The meeting was called to order by Chairman Eric Knapp.

Those attending: Board Members – Chair Eric Knapp, Executive Secretary Larry Crain, Treasurer Lisa Janz, Canada Director Michael Anderson, US Director Jim Hirstein. Also Webmaster George Struble.

Janz-Hirstein moved to approve the minutes at PIPEX 2023. Carried unopposed.

After discussion Janz-Anderson moved to buy a Zoom license to facilitate Zoom presentations among clubs and for the Board. Estimated cost is \$160. Carried unopposed. The Board agreed to hold a Zoom meeting on the first Tuesday of every even month, beginning in August.

Dues: The address to mail in dues will be put on the website. It was discussed setting up dues for a two-year basis but it was agreed to keep a one-year basis. Lisa will mail out all dues notices in the future. The dues notices will include the annual report form. Crain-Anderson moved to allow the Canadian dues to vary, but to be set by the exchange rate on November 1.

Anderson-Crain moved to authorize Lisa to explore banking online and consolidate the US and Canada accounts, and to check if signatories must be names or can they be positions on the Board.

Jim Hirstein reported on the John Arn Symposium. He said that in spite of raising fees, income was just about \$700 short of covering expenses because of the higher facility cost and lack of increased attendance. He will check into a different Saturday for the Symposium. Crain-Anderson moved to reimburse \$700. Carried 4-0, Hirstein abstained.

Without further business, the meeting was adjourned.

Annual General Meeting Minutes

Northwest Federation of Stamp Clubs PIPEX, Clackamas Room May 4, 2024

The meeting was called to order by Chairman of the Board of Directors, Eric Knapp.

The minutes of the previous Annual General Meeting at PIPEX 2023 were read. Maddux-Smith moved to approve them as read. Carried.

Eric Knapp said the Federation survived the Covid pandemic, but to go forward it needs to increase collaboration among the areas and the clubs in the Federation.

Executive Secretary Larry Crain listed the accomplishments of the past year: The opening of the bank account in US as directed by the Board of Directors last year, the re-application and receiving of non-profit status for the Federation and the naming of a new editor for *The Federated Philatelist*.

Lawrence Clay reviewed the history of the Federation, including formation by Washington clubs and major events which included: 1) PIPEX shows which moved from city to city for many years, but was stopped with the creation of the exhibit Champion of Champions which required larger venues to meet WSP frame minimums and more dealers to meet the costs; 2) problems with border crossings for dealers which stopped Canadian shows and this resulted in settling in Portland; 3) agreement of a separate group (Portland Philatelic Exhibitors) to lease

the name PIPEX to maintain uninterrupted WSP status for the show; 4) holding 30 years ago a Moses Lake Philatelic Day which became the John Arn Symposium; and 5) reoccurring problems finding an editor for *The Federated Philatelist*

Membership of the Federation: Anchorage PS – AK, Alaska CC – AK, Collectors Club of Seattle – WA, Eagle Stamp & Postcard Club – ID, Edmonton SC – AL, Evergreen SC – WA, Gastineau PS – AK, Greater Eugene SS – OR, Inland Empire PS – WA, Lynn Valley SC – BC, Northwest Philatelic Library – OR, Pacific Northwest Postal History – OR, Olympia PS – WA, Oregon SS – OR, Peace Arch SC – BC, Portland Philatelic Exhibitions – OR, Salem SS – OR, Snohomish/Greater Eastside SC – WA, Southern Oregon PS – OR, Strait Stamp Society – WA, Tri-Cities SC – WA, Umpqua Valley SC – OR, USS Puget Sound Ch #74 – WA.

Reports:

Website. New Webmaster George Struble reported that to get the site up he had to learn a different organization, that of files rather than templates which was used before.

Historian: Bill Ailes' report was not available at the meeting but is attached at the end.

John Arn Symposium. Jim Hirstein reported that the 32nd John Arn Symposium had 23 attendees, four main presentations, two short ones, two auctions and good times.

Nominations: There are two: J Palmer of the Inland Empire PS for US Director and Eric Knapp of the Anchorage PS and Alaska Collectors' Club for Chair of Board of Directors.

Judging, Youth and Education committees are currently vacant.

Publications. *The Federated Philatelist* Editor Carol Edholm said the journal is now up and running. She asked for article submissions, especially about the Northwest as that is not her collecting expertise.

Financial Statement for the prior Fiscal Year: Lisa Janz presented a Treasurer's report – also included at the end. She explained visiting or calling frequently the Oregon Department of Justice and the IRS to get the Federation a 501(c)3 non-profit status. First the Federation needed to be listed as a charitable organization by the state before the IRS would act. Currently, she has a letter saying the paperwork has been approved and the official letter will follow. A month later, it has still not been received. This hassle followed several meetings with the Oregon Department of Justice and Chase Bank to list the Federation with the state before the bank account could be transferred from Canada. Klein-Brandt moved to

approve the Treasurer's report. Carried without opposition. Lisa received a round of applause for her persistence and diligence.

Old Business: Larry Crain explained the four Federation Awards: Thunderbird ribbon, Federation Meritorious Achievement Award, Northwest Distinguished Philatelist Award and Member Service Award. He pointed out that few have been awarded recently. He referred to a list in the PIPEX program and to the April 2024 issue, #241, of *The Federated Philatelist* for the criteria. He hopes clubs will nominate one member for the Member Service Award every few years.

Budget: The By-Laws call for an agenda item to be presented of the Board of Directors' approved budget for the following fiscal year. Since the Board of Directors meets following this meeting, there is no budget yet approved. It was pointed out that income and expenses have remained steady and a budget would reflect the current Treasurer's report.

Referrals from Executive Secretary for advice: a. By-Law revisions to clean up items such as the budget from above or specific dates which are now unreasonable because of internet communication. These have been lived with but not strictly followed in the past. No action was taken. b. Formation of a Zoom Speakers Bureau to coordinate speakers from one club to present at another club. Examples of such presentations are two to be presented Sunday in the Clackamas meeting room. No volunteer was received to pursue. c. Is there a need for a regular Federation Forum publication monthly or so to email a list of shows and bourses? No decision made.

New Business: None.

Elections: With two open Canadian Board positions, Michael Anderson was nominated for the one-year term. No other nominations were received for any position. The candidates to be voted on are Eric Knapp for Chair of Board of Directors (3-year term), J Palmer for US Director (2-year term) and Michael Anderson for Canada Director (1-year term). Brandt-Hirstein moved to have the secretary cast a unanimous ballot for the three nominees. Carried, unopposed.

Without further business, the meeting was adjourned.



Charles H. Bebb designed his 19,000 square foot residence, which Boeing named Aldarra. Boeing moved in as a bachelor in 1914, but married Bertha Potter Paschall in 1921. Bertha had two young sons from a previous marriage, and the couple completed their family with their own son, William Boeing, Jr. Situated at the edge of a bluff overlooking Puget Sound, the impressive Mediterranean Revival residence has restrained detailing, a white stucco façade and red tile roof. The home was Boeing's principal residence until 1954 when he moved to his country estate near Fall City, just two years before his death. Boeing donated his home to Children's Orthopedic Hospital, which benefited from the sale of the estate to private owners. The William E. Boeing House is located on Huckleberry Lane in The Highlands, Washington. It is a private residence and not open to the public.

Remember when the Boeing Company supported their employees' hobby clubs? And then they didn't.

Boeing Employees Stamp Club held two shows a year, spring and summer. How many of you regularly bought and savored their interesting and gorgeous show covers? I sure did! Maybe it was due to my older brother leaving the Air Force after almost a decade and going to work for Boeing in early 1987 (he more recently retired). He worked for Boeing during the Gulf War and did contract work in Saudi Arabia during that time. My brother and his wife also spent time in France where he did more contract work for Boeing; he sent covers to me from the air shows in France where Boeing participated. He also gave me Flight Covers when a new plane went up. The last plane up was the 747-8 (we think). I don't think I will see a Flight Cover for the new 777-9 that is in the works – my sister in law will be retired by then IF Boeing will produce a Flight Cover. These covers were only available to the employees who worked on that plane's line.

But then, it could also simply be I am interested in the coves as the Boeing Everett plant is only 20 minutes from our home.

The Boeing Employee Stamp Club came into existence in 1955. They started doing show covers in 1976. In 2006, Boeing started pulling their financial and other support from all their employee clubs. In order to survive, the clubs had to find new ways of support, create new charters and form under different names; thus, Evergreen Stamp Club was born. Evergreen still has the Boeing show covers; the full list of what is available is on Page 21, or you can use the QR code below to order the covers you are missing from your collection. Cover you want not listed? Then it is no longer available.

Congratulations to the Strait Stamp Society

on 50 years, celebrated last August 5, 2023. Cathie Osborne, the sole remaining charter member of the Strait Stamp Society has kept the history of the Society over the years. In celebration of the club's 50 years, each issue of the *Strait Stamp Talk* newsletter in 2023 featured stories and photos that reflected moments and memories, friendships and fun, laughter and learning through the years.

A bit of their history:

In October 1973, when *Linn's Stamp News* was over 80 pages every week and *Scott* catalogue was a single volume, three stamp collectors were introduced to each other on the Seattle-Winslow ferry. They had been with a church group traveling to a convention in the city, and when friends realized the newcomer collected, they put her together with the "old white guys".

Lloyd Stipe, Elmer Dunn and Cathie Osborne got to talking and wondered if

there were any more collectors in the area. Consensus was to put an ad in the local *Port Angeles Daily News* inviting collectors to meet and then see what happens.

Six people showed up: Lloyd, Elmer, Cathie, Shep Sheppard, Mary Tate and one other. These collectors became Charter members who founded the Strait Stamp Society, a small club on Washington's Olympic Peninsula.

Lloyd, Elmer and Mary all collected US stamps, Shep liked Clallam/Jefferson County postal history, and Cathie was already into Bells. Their first meeting was at Elmer's house in December 1973. Soon after, they moved to a small Sunday School room at the Seventh-Day Adventist Church at 2nd and Cedar (now a transit center). That sufficed for most of the 70's.

In 1974, the club read about the Northwest Federation of Stamp Clubs, and a pregnant Cathie went to their meeting in Tumwater at PIPEX that year, riding the Greyhound bus down with her younger sister. The Executive of the Federation, Peter Steernburg, was encouraging and eager to have a new club in the area. So they applied and were accepted in 1977. (The Strait Stamp Society had to develop a Constitution as one of the requirements; that took some time.)

Strait Stamp Society membership grew, and in the early 1980's, their meetings were moved to the community building at what is now the Pebble Bay Apartments; one

of their members lived there. Dick Romane was President for several years until he moved away. Cathie couldn't always attend the meetings because of two preschoolers by then (and two older kids, but not old enough to babysit), so meeting notices went out monthly by postal card.

During those years, the club had two or three "shows" which were more like displays at the old Sequim Post Office building which was then the Sequim Museum at 2nd and

Cedar. Attendance at meetings has always been between 12 and 20 through the years, but they have always had enthusiastic members willing to share their hobby!

Also during the early 1980's, Cathie and Lloyd went to some Victoria, BC, shows, the first being in a social hall belonging to Christ Church Cathedral. So we knew they were there and began to meet a few of the members.

In 1986, PIPEX was in Victoria. Cathie, Rick and two older kids went over for the weekend; Cathie to the show, Rick to "do the town". On Saturday after the show, they rented a car and drove to Butchart Gardens to see the lights. It was June 14 with a long evening. And it had been and was a windy day.


While waiting for darkness, they were on benches watching a comedy show in the plaza area when a strong gust of wind went through. Rick, who had worked in the woods, heard the branch of a maple behind and above them crack, he looked up and said, "Here it comes." Before they could move, it hit him. He had covered Cathie with his body and the kids were able to move out, but he had a broken shoulder blade, five broken ribs, eggshell fractures to his face, 38 stitches in his scalp, concussion and all his teeth were loose. His face had hit the back of Cathie's head.

All this to say: The Chairman of PIPEX was Don Shorting, an MD. Rick was in the hospital two weeks in Victoria, and Don visited him and made sure that one of the better neurologists also checked on him. Through this, a philatelic friendship was formed.

Soon, Strait Stamp Society moved into the library's meeting room in Sequim. Membership held steady and they acquired a newsletter edited by Tom Reed, a retired *Post Intelligencer* reporter. They even had some younger members, Lisa Foster (currently of Spanaway, Washington) being one of them.

Through this time, Don Shorting kept saying that we should try a show – and by the way, the Victoria clubs had a number of six-page frames they needed to pass on because they had purchased 16-page frames. In the early 1990's, the club agreed to pay \$5 a six-page frame, and the seeds for their first actual grown-up show were sown!

Cathie bought and read books on how to do a show, and the process began – publicity, show cancel, venue, exhibits, dealers, more publicity...And people volunteered their time and enthusiasm to put the first one together in 1994. Their cancel that year was the town logo (which has been replaced in the name of whatever it is that insists new is better).



about dealers crossing the border, making so many requirements that they couldn't afford to go either way (VERY sad!). So the Victorians who wanted to shop with US dealers came across the Strait to get their "fix"!

So many good years! Club members have always been so generous and enthusiastic. The late Sequim postmaster, Gregoy Emerick, has made many contributions to our club. The club has tried to keep "boring" business out of their meetings and emphasize stamps and fellowship. Life is too short to waste on reading minutes and hearing treasurer's reports!



Artists were sought out for cachet art for our covers and soon Tim Quinn, local political cartoonist, was doing the cancel designs. He got the hang of the required dimensions and rules and was a delight to work with.

From the first, the club offered rides to Victorians who wanted to come to the show. In the late 1980's or early 1990's, the governments of both countries got snippy

I guess I shouldn't complain about lack of enthusiasm when I expose my hobby to the uninitiated. My remarks when presented with other peoples' hobbies are not very intelligent, either. I mean, what do you say to someone who collects matchbook covers, or who ties knots in string, or who grows plants whose names I couldn't pronounce even if I could remember them? I even have problems when introduced to someone whose stamp collecting interests are different than mine. Can't you just imagine?

"I collect one each of all the new stamps at the post office, as an investment for my grandchildren."

"That's nice. You know the chances of their bringing a profit are pretty well nil?"

No, I think it is safer if I stick to the inane. And perhaps I should be glad my friends do, too!

One of the joys of my college years was the way bits and pieces of information gathered and stored over the years finally fell into place. After years of accumulating facts, I was finally able to link them together to make an orderly unit. Literature started to fit in with economics, music with history, religion with art, each another facet of the

whole. This was especially exciting to me. I can remember leaving lectures smiling, because of a new piece that fit.

This joy has been rediscovered since I began collecting stamps as an adult. Stamps encompass the whole of history, literature, art and daily life, and I'm constantly running into a stamp that relates to or expands other areas of my life. My research into my topic often brings a connection between two isolated particulars and opens up a new way of seeing. These new vistas are as exciting and breathtaking and soul-satisfying to me as hiking in the mountains, rounding a bend and suddenly being confronted with a view that fills the whole realm of vision. Stamp vistas just a minute away from my kitchen!

An example: The Fort Ticonderoga of many boring history classes was once named Fort Carillon – a fun fact discovered on vacation for my "bells on stamps" collection. And the Australian stamp showing a pack horse wearing a bell is fleshed out by the books of an author I discovered for my "fun" reading – Arthur Upton.

The appeal of stamps is the appeal of knowledge in place.

CATHIE'S COLUMN

Being the only partner collecting stamps in a marriage is often not easy. And if you are the wife, very likely your philatelic activities are severely restricted, either by children, lack of finances or guilt. (After all, what woman prefers an evening at the stamp club to sewing a fine seam?)

However, when husbands were distributed, I got first prize. My husband's patience and vicarious enthusiasm (whether simulated or not) for my hobby is really remarkable. He actually listens when I share with him some new tidbit of information; and he even gets mildly excited when I make a "find". Two or three times a year he will transport me to the nearest shows, and babysit while I look, listen and absorb all I can in one afternoon.

The depth of his regard for me has shown the last two years by his taking me, sans children, to three-day shows in Portland. This year, at PIPEX, we covered the exhibits shoulder to shoulder; and while I attended the judges' critique, he searched in dealers' boxes for my collecting interests. I now report a few observations of a non-collecting spouse.

Rick enjoyed the exhibits and learned from them. Especially fascinating to him were the exhibits of DPO's of Oregon. His job takes him all through the state, and he is a history buff. However, he noticed a lack of precision in some of the maps drawn to locate post offices. Exhibitors note: Most non-collectors who visit a stamp show have their own area of expertise. Woe to your exhibit in their eyes should you boo-boo in their field.

Another area Rick made a comment on was the area included in "presentation" by the judges. He noticed misspellings, missing or incorrect punctuation, erasures, strike-overs, different styles and ages of pages in the same exhibit. Too much material on a page, with too much trying for clever symmetry also drew a negative comment from him. (Does he sound like the schoolteacher he is?) For the hand-lettered pages, he noted that the printing styles used should be consistent.

After the awards were attached to the exhibits, both Rick and I enjoyed going back and seeing if our choices agreed with those of the judges. But one comment Rick made over breakfast the next morning struck me as a delightful idea. Rick would like to cast a vote for his favorite exhibit. Wouldn't a Popular Award be a drawing card? More collectors and non-collectors alike would look at exhibits if their vote counted. And you couldn't help but have people learning things, which in turn would help the hobby (more educated collectors, right?). Collectors like me would invite their spouses and friends to come along and "at least, vote"! More people at the show would mean more people with the dealers, even if they hadn't meant to buy.

Well, we settled that issue over breakfast.

PIPEX '78 was a delightful experience for me, probably because Rick enjoyed himself as much as he did (he was able to watch a Sonics game uninterrupted by children and found some good sales at Lloyd Center while I immersed myself in meetings and seminars and cover boxes.) Already, we're saving so we can go again next year!

In addition to the 12 attractive non-competitive (fun) exhibits, there were 11 exhibits judged at SOPEX 2024 by outstandingly thorough Judges Jim Busse and Ralph Nafziger.

Larry Maddux won the Grand and a Gold for his *Use of Postage Stamps in the United States 1947-1873*, and a Gold and the Carley Cup for *Discontinued Post Offices of Jackson, Josephine and Coos Counties that Were Established in the 19th Century*.

Nancy Swan's *Birthstones* received a Gold and the Display Trophy, and a Vermeil and Herbert Trophy for the topical The Heraldic Lion.

Larry Crain's *Postcards: Iceland 100 Years Ago* won a Vermeil, Sterton Trophy and NW Federation ribbon, and his *19th Century US Post Offices Named El Dorado* was awarded a Silver and the AAPE Award.

The judges awarded Rick Aubin a Silver for his colorful postcard exhibit on *Railroad Car Fruit and Vegetable Exaggerations* 1941-1945 and a Bronze for *Censored World War II Airmail Covers* 1941-1945.

John Swenson's *Mutiny on the Bounty & the Occupation of Pitcairn Island* also received a Bronze.

Dickson Preston, 1940-2024



Military Postal History Society member and former American Philatelic Society accredited judge, Dickson Preston of Seattle Washington, died March 9 at age 83. His most recent exhibit was the APOs in Greenland. In addition to Greenland, he collected Denmark, Danish West Indies, Württemberg, German East Africa, commercial Zeppelin mail, the U.S. Presidential ("Prexie") series, Canal Zone, and the CIPEX souvenir sheet. He exhibited many of these collections.

Preston's articles have appeared in the *Posthorn*, *U.S. Specialist*, *American Philatelist*, *Air Post Journal*, *German Postal Specialist*, and *Canal Zone Philatelist* among other journals. He served

as former Chairman of Exhibits and Judging of the Northwest Federation of Stamp Clubs and was former Exhibits Chairman of SEAPEX. He was a retired professor from the University of Washington. ~ *Alan Warren*, *Military Postal History Society**********

Michael D. Dixon, 1937-2024

Noted philatelist and exhibition organizer Michael Dixon died March 9, 2024 at age 86. He was an accredited APS chief judge for philatelic and literature exhibits, an FIP judge, and a member of the FIP Literature Commission. He exhibited nationally and internationally beginning in the 1970s. He held many responsible positions in organized philately but was best known as President and Board chairman of the Washington 2006 International Exhibition.

Michael was a Fellow of the Royal Philatelic Society London, served on its Council 1980-1983, and was a consultant to their expertizing committee. He held several positions on the board of the NAPEX show including show chairman. He was past president of the Latin American Collectors Club, and a vice president of the American Philatelic Congress. Michael served on several APS committees including CANEJ; Technology International; a consultant to Expertizing; and also on the Board as director-at-large. He was Commissioner for the US to exhibitions in Germany and the United Kingdom.



His collecting interests included GB King Edward VIII and Wilding issues, British Forces air mail letter cards and air letters of WWII, GB WWII POW air mail postal stationery, and Paris pneumatic mails among other subjects. His articles have appeared in the *London Philatelist*, *American Philatelist*, the Great Britain Philatelic Society's *Chronicle*, *Mainsheet*, *Filatelia Peruana*, and the *American Philatelic Congress Book*. Following the Washington 2006 exhibition, Michael relocated to Portland, Oregon where he overhauled the APS World Series of Philately show PIPEX and served as its general manager.

Michael Dixon was awarded the London Medal for service to the Royal Philatelic Society London. He was honored with the Northwest Federation's Distinguished Philatelist Award in 2015. In 2012, he received the APS John N. Luff award for exceptional contributions to philately.

He was born in London, obtained advanced degrees and worked for a scientific abstracting and indexing firm. He and his family moved to Maryland in 1982 to head the firm's U.S. subsidiary, and he later served as a consultant to the U.S. government. Dixon is survived by his wife Carolyn, a sister, and two sons and their families. ~ Alan Warren, Military Postal History Society

OREGON POSTAL HISTORY QUERY

I receive the Northwest Federation of Stamp Clubs email newsletter as a member and officer of the Alaska Collectors' Club and thought I'd contact you concerning two Oregon postal history matters I have in hopes you might be able to refer them to the right person(s) since I am not very knowledgeable about Oregon postal history. Incidentally, I also collect PIPEX covers.

My first question is about the 1985 Whittlesey-Helbock catalog listing (p. 116) of "Lackemute" and the later listing of "Luckiamute" (p. 130) with a reference back to Lackemute. As it turns out, my wife Virginia's maternal 2nd great-grandparents, James & Elizabeth Smith, purchased a donation land claim on the Luckiamute after arriving in Oregon on the last day of 1846 after surviving being members of the first wagon train to use the so-called Applegate Trail (it was not fit for covered wagons & was longer than the usual route). Virginia has researched who owned/occupied the land prior to her ancestors and learned it was the Luckiamute band of Kalapuya; a confirming archaeological site is found approximately 5 miles directly east of the Smith donation claim (U of of Natural History, Oregon, Museum Archaeological Survey, James Bell, Feb 7, 1981). The only place we have found the term "Lackemute" is in the 1985 catalog; we think it is a mis-reading of the January 28, 1851, Luckimiute cover shown on page 1 of the Winter 1983 Oregon Postal History Journal. While there

are spelling variations of the Native American names involved, we think Lackemute is the least accurate and needs to be struck from a revised Oregon postmark catalog. As another aside, a good hiking friend of Virginia's is Barbara Whittlesey, daughter of Charles A. Whittlesey!

The second item you might be able to help with is that I have a 1909 White Pass and Yukon postcard with a Hot Lake, Oregon cancel that I would like to trade for a similar value Alaska item. Since the 1985 Oregon catalog lists "Hotlake" (one word) instead of two words, I believe the postmark might be uncommon but perhaps it was one word before 1900.

I find postal history fascinating and have been collecting Alaska material since my first day in the state in 1965. Please let me know if I might be of help to you or your friends with any Alaska postal history related questions or any questions related to this request.

A brief summary of what happened with the merger of the two clubs:

The Vancouver Island Philatelic Society (VIPS) was established in 1931. The Greater Victoria Philatelic Society (GVPS) was established in 1939. Membership in each club had been declining for a few years, but was particularly hard hit by the impact of the COVID-19 pandemic in 2020. Leadership positions were becoming hard to fill

Club leaders held informal discussions in the spring of 2023 about the possibility of joining resources by merging the two clubs together. An Executive Advisory Group was created made up of the executive members of each club plus other respected senior leaders. Its purpose was to make policy recommendations about the merger.

It was agreed to take the merger idea to the membership and, on June 16, 2023, a town hall meeting was held where all members from each club were invited. At this meeting, the problems facing the clubs and the need for change were laid out. An informal poll on the merger concept was held and there was strong support from those in attendance. However, the members also said they wanted to ensure a structured process would carry this out.

In response, specific voting procedures were prepared which included voter eligibility and balloting processes. These were approved at a Special General Meeting and member voting proceeded during August 2023. The merger was unanimously approved.

Since the merger, we have set ourselves the broad objective of growing the hobby across Vancouver Island. It's not so much about increasing our club membership per se (although that would be nice), but more about reaching all collectors with philatelic news and resources. There are other clubs on the Island and, as the largest club with the most resources, we want to support them as well.

To reach this objective, we focused on improving our communications and have completely updated our website which is refreshed regularly with news and resources. We have created a new email distribution system and are reaching more people who are not members, but who are interested collectors. We have also updated our meeting structure and program planning.

So far, we have been seeing a healthy uptick in new membership and also the return of previous members. Some of this is probably attributable to the pent-up demand for social activity during the pandemic, but it has certainly created a new and positive energy in our meetings.
